Professor Presents Lecture In Honor Of Autism Awareness Month

In honor of Autism Awareness Month, Ran An, a professor in the Department of Health and Human Performance, presented "Interprofessional Collaboration: Supporting Children with Autism Spectrum Disorder" on April 4 in the Leahy Forum.

The professor spoke about autism's historical background, commons myths and roles that each profession offers for children with autism. She left the audience to think about the interprofessional collaborations involving autism and plans in the future to ameliorate a child with autism into the

In the beginning of her presentation, the

professor elaborated on the history of the term "autism." In the 1930s, researchers had used the term "autism" to describe a lack of social communication and interaction skill. Later, they realized this condition encompassed a wider range of difficulties and abilities.

Today, autism spectrum disorder is defined by the DSM-5 (Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, 5th Edition) as a persistent deficit in social communication and social interaction.

The professor explained that those with autism spectrum disorder can have high and low functioning abilities. This range consists of being gifted in math, art and science to struggling to accomplish basic life skills like eating, showering and cooking.

Next, she briefly went over facts about autism. One fact was that children with autism struggle with social communication and sensory sensitivity. Another fact she mentioned is in regard to stimming. Stimming involves a person self-stimulating themselves, which is a protected response in order to relieve the sensory input. A popular myth in regard to stimming is that it is a behavior that should be

Speaking of sensory input, there were two distinctive terms she used: hyposensitivity and hypersensitivity. Hyposensitivity is when someone is very sensitive to noises, pain or heat and cold. Hypersensitivity is when someone is overly sensitive to bright lights or

anything that can be overstimulated. Among sensory input issues, there are other associated disabilities that children with autism sometimes face. These include intellectual disabilities, learning disabilities, motor behavior deficits, psychiatric diagnosis, ADHD, language disorders and medical problems such as gastrointestinal disorders.


The professor introduced specific professions that usually work with children with autism spectrum disorder and how professionals in these fields can help children with disabilities like autism spectrum disorder.



Silicon Valley Bank Failure Highlights Fragility Of Banks Amid Economic Uncertainty

As a string of recent failures has left industry insiders questioning the strength of these institutions in today's unpredictable economic climate, the cracks in the foundation of the banking system are becoming increasingly apparent.

Headlines involving the collapse of multiple regional banks in recent weeks have stirred up bad memories of the 2008 financial crisis, causing Americans to lose faith in the system.

Our economy relies on a fractional reserve system that allows banks to lend out a large portion of the money they receive from customer deposits. This effectively enables banks to use consumer deposits to make loans or invest in risk-free government bonds.

While this system facilitates economic growth, it becomes dangerous in the event of a bank run, which would pressure banks to meet customer withdrawal requests even if they have already lent out their customers' money for an extended period. This fabled scenario was thought to be a reminiscence of the old economy, until recently. Lately, interest rate hikes have played a major role in the collapse of multiple regional-sized banks, such as Silicon Valley Bank (SVB), which have seen an exodus of customer deposits in a true "bank run" fashion.

However, the Federal Reserve's actions have been heavily influenced by the federal government's excessive spending

in response to inflation. According to the Treasury Department, the United States government has been running a budget deficit since 2001, meaning more money is being spent than taken in.

Edward Scahill, Ph.D., a University of Scranton Economics Professor for over 30 years, argues that, while "the Fed kept interest rates very low for too long," the nation's fiscal policy has "placed great pressure on the [Federal Reserve]."

This pressure, combined with excess cash resulting from the influx of customer deposits and stimulus checks during the pandemic, created a difficult situation for banks like SVB, which had few places to deploy their excess capital, according to reports by The New York Times. Companies and individuals who received generous fiscal stimulus funding during the pandemic had little desire for additional loans, pressuring banks to park their excess cash in bonds during the peak of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Following the stabilization of macroeconomic conditions, consumers unleashed excess cash and began spending, utilizing what some consider to be overly generous fiscal stimulus checks that they had received from the government. This excess spending mixed with exceptionally low-interest rates made the economy boom, bringing inflation to a 40-year high in June 2022 and forcing Chairman Powell to combat rising

I decided to answer some frequently asked questions about the new phenomena that is taking the world by storm. To get the answers, I went straight to the source itself. All of the answers below are credited to ChatGPT.

future of jobs, education and our creativity.

What is ChatGPT?

ChatGPT is an artificial intelligence powered agent designed to process natural language input and generate human-like responses in real-time. ChatGPT can understand the context of conversations and generate coherent and contextually relevant responses to what the user inputs.

Could ChatGPT be dangerous?

ChatGPT is not inherently dangerous as it is designed to engage in human-like conversations and provide helpful responses. However, like any technology, it can be misused or manipulated for malicious purposes.

Is copying ChatGPT considered plagiarism?

Using ChatGPT to generate responses to a prompt or question and presenting those responses as one's own original work could be considered plagiarism, just as copy and pasting text from a source without proper attribution would be considered plagiarism. It is important for the user to ensure any text generated by ChatGPT is properly cited or attributed.

How do I know if what ChatGPT is saying is true?

ChatGPT does not have the ability to determine what is true or false on its own. The information it generates is based on patterns and relationships it has learned and been trained on, and it tries to generate responses relevant to the input it received. Therefore, it is important to use it as a tool to supplement one's own knowledge and understanding, rather than relying solely on its responses as a source of truth.

Hiring a private detective to solve the case might sound like a good idea to him, but Letty had a plan and a place to escape.




